This has been a great summer for Hampton Roads Lodge 3-522. Winning the 3rd District small lodge of the year for 2002 was pretty great I thought, but winning the same honor in the International competition was amazing. Congratulations to President Deanna Rumney, her 2002 board and the lodge. I was most pleased

that George and Anita Hill were at the District convention so they could receive the plaque for the lodge. They have worked so hard for so many years for the lodge and it was most fitting the lodge earned the honors as the Hills get ready to move North.

Terri Hewitt's work earned her the "Newsletter of the year" award. which she really deserved.

We also won the large lodge competition for the largest net increase in membership both in District competition as well as in the International competition.

Over \$10,000 was raised for the SON Foundation. Those funds will be used to aid those members who suffered damage from Hurricane Charlie and a forest fire that destroyed SON member's homes in Northern California. We will have a full report in the October edition on the two conventions that will include other lodge winners and some of the results of the convention.

Another item that is of concern to us is the building of an Aviation display that will be built landward of the Norwegian lady. This project will include improvements to the Norwegian Lady plaza. Although we never had an opportunity to meet him, as he died when my father was an infant, he left behind a wonderful legacy and a great deal of "Norweigian Pride" in my father's heart which has been passed down to his children. It's interesting that from our Mother's side we a have different heritage, but somehow we always think of ourselves as "Norwegian"!

If we are accepted as members of SON, we would look forward to establishing many new and exciting friendships and learning more about the people and customs of Norway.

Greg Nordhougen

I am originally from Fargo, North Dakota, where my grandfather Gilman, a linotype operator for the Fargo Forum, settled after a brief career teaching at the North Dakota School for the Deaf in Devils Lake. He was the youngest of several children of Tollef Nordhougen, a blacksmith who settled in Northwood, Dakota Territory. His stay in eastern North Dakota, in the Cooperstown and Aneta area, is where the roots of most of the Nordhougen family took hold. Tollef emigrated in 1858 from Lillehammer, Norway. He was the youngest of two brothers, and left the family farm to his older brother

Johannes. A part of the farm is still in the family, who are known as Olsen and of which there is one remaining relative known. For some reason, he spelled the family name as Nordhougen, not as Nordhougen, the correct spelling of the family farm, and this has constantly caused problems as all good Scandinavians try to correct the spelling.

Tollef claimed to be a cousin of the great Norwegian violinist Ole Bull, and is said to have helped fashion the gilded horses that sit on the Minnesota State Capitol Building. My father has the letters he received from Norway, and copies of the letters he sent as well as many boxes of photographs given from nearly all the surviving Nordhougens. Now we just have to figure out who everybody is.

Tollef's son Carl developed a new strain of disease resistant wheat in the late 1920's which boosted yields up to 40 bushels. His work contributed to the fabulous growth of wheat farming in North Dakota. Carl was shipping seed wheat to Canada and Argentina by the railroad carload in the 1930's. Carl's son, Orris, became a senator in the state legislature and was well known to be fair. He was adopted into a Sioux indian tribe for his work in helping the indians. North Dakota's late longserving US Senator, Quentin Burdick, entered the Senate after defeating Orris in his senate campaign. Back to me. After moving from Fargo to the Twin Cities and then Detroit, I attended Michigan State University, married, and entered the Navy where I served as a Supply Corps officer for nearly ten years. I currently work for Science Applications International Corporation (SAIC) at NATO Allied Command Transformation and still play Navy as a very active reservist. My wife Pam is a high school teacher in Michigan and will join me permanently next year after many visits and one final school year in Michigan. Government officials have launched a new website, in English, aimed at helping foreigners get acquainted with life in Norway.

Cabinet Minister Morten Andreas Meyer called the site a "guide to public services" in Norway. It also offers practical information about studying, working and living in Norway.

The new site www.norway.no also contains information for tourists, with tips for traveling both to Norway and around the country by air, train and car. The government launched another site earlier this year, called BAZAR (www.bazar.deichman.no) which also helps guide foreigners through the day-to-day aspects of living in Norway.





UN: 'It's best to live in Norway'

For the third year in a row, the United Nations' Development Program has ranked Norway as having the best standard of living in the world. Norwegians beat out all others because of their high levels of education, pay and life expectancy. Norway's average life expectancy is 78.4 years and 99 percent of the population can read and write, according to the survey. The country has 413 doctors per 100,000 citizens and Norwegians are wealthier than ever before. Norwegians are known to complain nonetheless, over everything from high prices to long waits for non-emergency medical care, cuts in police and school budgets and a shortage of day care and nursing home spaces. Government minister Hilde Frafjord Johnson, who is in charge of Norway's foreign programs, doesn't dismiss the complaints. "But there are few who are so well off as we
